Spicy Sausage Quiche

Anna Lee Peterson - Frederick, MD

I have been making this family favorite since my three children were babies. It is easy and can be enjoyed any time of day. The variations are a nice way to keep it interesting and provide veggies for the family.

Serves 6

1 1/4 cups skim milk
 4 large eggs
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 1/4 teaspoon pepper
 2 cups shredded Cheddar or Swiss cheese
 2 tablespoons flour
 1/2 pound spicy sausage, cooked and crumbled
 1 frozen (9-inch deep dish) piecrust

- * Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F.
- * Combine the milk, eggs, salt, and pepper in a large bowl. Mix well and set aside.
- * In a medium bowl, toss the cheese with the flour and add to the egg mixture. Add the sausage and stir to combine thoroughly. Pour into the piecrust and bake on the middle oven rack for 40-45 minutes, or until a toothpick inserted into the center comes out clean.

Variations: If you like vegetables, consider adding 1/4 cup finely diced onions, mushrooms, broccoli, and/or spinach.

Conference Wrap-Up (continued)

Proposal on more equitable representation is returned: A proposal from the Mission and Ministry Board responding to a query on equitable representation on the board did not receive the two-thirds majority required to pass. The officers ruled that the decision of the 2012 Conference to refer the concerns of the query to the Mission and Ministry Board still stands and that the board should do further work and bring a different answer to the 2014 Annual Conference. The officers provided an opportunity for delegates to submit recommendations to the board for its further work.

Increased number on Mission and Ministry Board executive committee: A proposal to increase the number of members of the Executive Committee of the Mission and Ministry Board was approved.

Cost of living for pastors: The delegates approved a 1.4 percent cost of living increase to the minimum cash salary table for pastors for 2014.

Delegate body handles a packed business agenda

Delegates to the Church of the Brethren Annual Conference on June 29-July 3 in Charlotte, N.C., handled a packed business agenda, led by moderator Bob Krouse, pastor of Little Swatara Church of the Brethren in Bethel, Pa. Assisting Krouse were moderator elect Nancy Sollenberger Heishman and 'Conference secretary

James Beckwith.

A full Day of Spiritual Renewal prepared for the business sessions. Popular speakers Philip Yancey and Mark Yaconelli led morning and afternoon worship. There were Equipping Workshops, a Concert of Prayer, meal events including the Brethren Press and Messenger dinner with theologian Stanley Hauerwas, and a reception hosted by the Mission and Ministry Board and staff.

Recognition for the Church of the Brethren in Spain: The Conference recognized with enthusiasm the Brethren movement taking hold in Spain. The church got started about 10 years ago when Brethren from the Dominican Republic emigrated to Spain to find employment and started churches.

'Biblical Inspiration and Authority' paper still relevant: "How do you decide in 30 minutes what to do with a...3,000 year old book?" asked moderator Bob Krouse, during the discussion of a query on biblical authority from Virlina District. The action of the 2013

Conference was "that the 1979 Annual Conference statement on Biblical Inspiration and Authority is still relevant and represents the position of the denomination today. We encourage its ongoing study in personal and corporate settings."

Resolution Against Drone Warfare is adopted: Developed by the Office of Public Witness, the document was adopted by the Mission and Ministry Board earlier this year. Thought to be the first statement against military drones by an American church body, it addresses the use of drones in warfare in the context of a reaffirmation of the Brethren assertion that "war is sin" and cites scripture and previous Conference statements. The resolution calls for action by the church and its members, and by the President and Congress.

Revision to Ministerial Leadership Polity is returned: The Revision to Ministerial Leadership Polity was received with appreciation, but returned to the Mission and Ministry Board "for revision in accordance with Standing Committee concerns, to be brought back to the 2014 Annual Conference." The Standing Committee of district delegates had spent time discussing the revision. Concerns centered in four areas: lack of mention of the plural non-salaried ministry (free ministry), the mandatory makeup of the cohort for each minister, transition of the new "commissioned minister" status to ordained minister, and what happens if there is a change of call for a commissioned minister.

Love in Action

"...If I have prophetic powers, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing..." (1 Corinthians 13:1-3). "You are loved by Jesus." It's a message that we all need to hear. It also provided a great foundation for daily worship at National Junior High Conference at Elizabethtown College last month.

Our time together in worship reminded us of Jesus' love, and then went beyond that message to call us to action. During each worship service a new nugget of knowledge was added: You are loved by Jesus. Now speak! Now give! Now move! "I loved you before you even existed," said an actor representing God in our opening worship service. "I created you with great care, and made you wonderful. You are unlike any other person, and you have a purpose in life that cannot be fulfilled by anyone else."

The depth of God's love is beyond our understanding, but participants caught glimpses of it throughout the weekend. It was in worship, and it was in workshops; it was in recreation time and meals together. We even saw it portrayed through some pretty great characters during worship.

There were moments that made us laugh, like when poor Lee "lost" his cell phone in one skit and couldn't function without it. As well as moments that made us stop and think, as when "Jesus" broke bread for us, revealing to his disciples who he truly was. More than 400 junior high students and leaders from all over the country came together for one weekend at National Junior High Conference. We heard God's call to love, and to let our love speak through action. We had lots of fun, and we also worshiped together. That is what God's love is truly about: Speaking love in community, giving love in faith, and moving love into action.

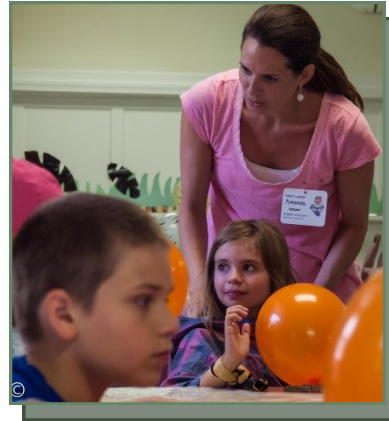

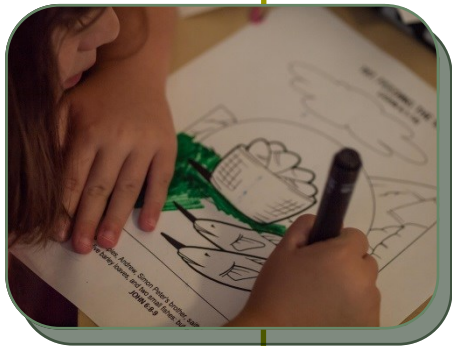

Conference Reflections

The overall dedication of all conference participants was the first thing which appealed to me. These individuals included, but were not limited to: hymn leader, blind brothers who were members of the choir, our stressed “no music” choir director, leaders and interpreters for worship session and the main speakers. I was also impressed by the professionalism of the conference center security personnel, particularly when it came down to locating the “wandering disabled” conference attendee.

I very much enjoyed Philip Yancey’s presentation (*Grace*) - both sermon and workshop. Likewise, the messages of Mark Yaconelli (*Prayers*) and Sue Inhauser (*Move In Our Midst Through US!*).

As to workshops, I chose several which I had found to be very interesting. BDM (Brethren Disaster Ministries) has changed quite a bit since I was a “tween-aged”, wall-washing, mud slinger. It was nice to learn about the more recent emphasis on rebuild, after others have done basic cleanup. I’ve been re-inspired; maybe I’ll help build a couple of houses in OK in a few years. The Mission Field In Your Own Backyard was quite informative. It was very useful to learn the actual step-by-step process necessary to establish a campus ministry appealing to young adults. As well, it was useful to be reminded of the particular needs/situations of this age group.

Last, but not least, was the workshop addressing the topic of multicultural evangelism which I attended - simultaneous-

ly presented in 2 languages. The interpreter for this workshop exhibited extreme professionalism. To attendees, the challenge was made. Similarly to the young adult population, learn the specific needs/situations pertaining to specific cultures. Use what you learn to Engage, Encourage and Educate. Participants were asked how many of us were bilingual or even multilingual. Imagine my surprise to learn that in a group of approximately 80 people, there were only 3 of us - the pastor from Roanoke, the interpreter and me. I count English as one language, ASL (American Sign Language) and my very rusty, but still semi-fluent Castilian Spanish, I was absolutely amazed to learn that I was the only multilingual person in the room. That led to a whole lot of thought provoking further discussion among participants.

Annual Conference presented me with one other significant pleasure - friends both old and new. It was nice to connect with some new friends - those who live a distance away and a few who actually reside quite close. It was also great fun to re-connect with some friends whom I haven’t seen in person any time in the last 36-45 years! Yes, some of the “gang” from college days and one woman from my Camp Eder days—as camper, not counselor. It is always interesting to note how conversation with these long-term friends always seem to pick up where they last left off, no matter how many “not face-to-face” years have intervened.

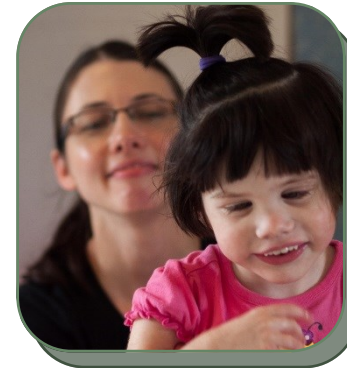
