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Silence Broken: A Memoir

I opened up the door of the car into the gas pump and withdrew it quickly, but it was fine. I was at a rest stop on the way to a Church of the Brethren Workcamp. I know, sounds fun doesn't it? Jan Bachman was driving her daughter Emma and I to the camp and Jan would be staying as an advisor, which is short for chaperone and counselor. When we got back on the road, we talked and I dozed off after a while.

When we finally arrived at our destination, very stiff and tired, we realized that we would be staying in a church and according to Jan it was called something like Living Faith Church of the Brethren in North Carolina. As we walked inside we saw some teens that we didn't know and Jan went off to talk to some adults that she obviously knew. As I walked on with Emma I saw a room with a bunch of guys setting up air mattresses and sleeping bags and headed on inside. They asked my name and where I was from. As I looked around the room I saw absolutely no floor space left. Based on the décor, the room had obviously been a church youth

room. There were two couches that were occupied, and a table piled high with luggage. Everything else in the room, including a gigantic badly made cardboard Jesus cutout was crowded. I asked if this was the only room for the guys and they said it was. So I set up my sleeping bag under the table and piled my luggage on top with everyone else's. After a few awkward minutes of sitting there in silence with a bunch of guys that all looked like juniors and seniors, we were called to the fellowship hall, which is the eating area of the church, to do some icebreaker/ name games. As usual I couldn't remember anyone's name and I am pretty sure the icebreakers didn't break the ice for anyone. After that we ate a simple meal of vegetables and potatoes

and stuff of the like and went to bed.

The next morning we ate a slightly better meal of bagels, cereal and fruit. Then we made our sandwiches for lunch and after putting on loads of bug-screen and sun-spray, departed in silence for our first work location. As we pulled into the driveway, we noticed a sign that said Wings of Eagles Therapeutic Horseback Riding and Summer Camp. When we parked, a smiling rugged looking woman came out of a strangely rainbow colored building, and motioned for us to follow her. We got ourselves into a circle and she progressed to explain what her ranch did. It turned out she

Review of Annual Conference 2013

At the risk of some redundancy from my July Blog, I want to share just two reflections about this year's Annual Conference. (Lots of other information has been shared in this newsletter over the past three months.) First, the conference was less anxious than we often choose to make it. Some attribute this to the table format in which delegates built pockets of pseudo-community as fellow-Brethren prior to tackling difficult or divisive issues of polity, posturing, or prophecy. Some attribute the less-anxious presence to the "Day of Prayer" set aside on Sunday. Still others credit the officers' modeled disregard for Roberts Rules paving the way to non-rule-based-thinking.

Myself, I suspect it was the result of a more-or-less conscious decision. Prior to conference I believe that several of our recently vocal groups chose to be different. This in no way lessens the importance of their underlying witness; it does, however, reflect a choice (for this year). And I'm thankful for that.

Second, we received a challenge from our 2014 Moderator to read the book of Philippians. As arguably the most affirming and encouraging book in the Bible, Philippians is a great choice. And surprising things happen when we open the Bible together. As our Moderator points out in one quote: "Let's be warned; to dust off the Bible is to play with fire. It's one huge messy archive of God's ongoing relationship with real people. That's what makes it such a profound treasure. It's a dangerous thing to put the Bible in the hands of ordinary folks who actually read it - especially if it awakens in them a hunger for God, for justice, and for salvation. We trust the God to whom it [the Bible] witnesses. We don't trust God because we trust the Bible. We trust the Bible because we trust God. It's an act of faith always to read it and grant it authority." (Tom Yoder Neufeld, Address to Mennonite Church Canada's 2012 Assembly)

The conference was especially enjoyable since our Director of Music John Shafer led the choir, Linda Powell represented us well as our delegate, and Angela Finet sang a solo as part of the pivotal Tuesday worship service. And we came away with a sense of encouragement, hopefulness, and invitation through the choices we made, the less-anxious witness, and the call toward Philippians we received.

Hobgoblin Goulash

Merry Christina Roy - East Wenatchee, WA

We made the recipe after Halloween, cutting up the jack-o-lanterns or using pumpkins from the garden. It has a special place in the hearts of my adult offspring. This recipe calls for chili seasoning mix because that's easier. But I usually use a mixture of chili powder, ground cumin, and garlic powder, adjusting for my family's taste.

6 servings

2 slices bacon, diced

1 pound ground beef

1 medium onion, chopped

1 green bell peppers, coarsely chopped

1 1/2 cups pumpkin or winter squash, peeled and cubed

1 (15-ounce) can tomatoes

1 (15-ounce) can kidney beans, undrained

1 (1 3/4-ounce) envelope chili seasoning mix

1 cup uncooked elbow macaroni

- * Cook the bacon in a large saucepan over medium heat until crisp but not brown. Drain on paper towels.
- * Cook the ground beef, onion, and bell pepper in the bacon drippings over medium heat. Pour off the excess fat.
- * Add the pumpkin or squash, tomatoes, beans, chili seasoning, cooked bacon, and 2 1/2 cups water to the beef in the saucepan. Bring to a boil over high heat.
- * Add the macaroni, cover, and reduce the heat to medium low. Simmer, stirring occasionally, for 15 minutes or until the macaroni and vegetables are tender.

was the owner and manager of this therapeutic ranch. She founded it after her son, who has physical and mental disabilities, tried horseback riding and it cleared his mind and taught him better control over his limbs. According to her, she felt that God was constantly calling her to help other children and teens by starting a large scale therapeutic ranch. In a week she had left her current home, sold it, bought a new 30 acre half wooded, half field estate. She then spent almost all of her money reserves and time building two new houses. She built one for her and her family to live in and one for the headquarters for her camp, several barns, a stable, a riding arena, and several miles worth of electric fence. With her remaining money she bought horses, equipment, and posters to advertise. After the completion of the buildings she had little money for her family, but people came for riding and tons of donation money came in from people who wanted to help. So over the years she set up summer camps, hired interns, cut shaded horseback riding trails through the woods, erected ropescourses and many more amazing things that she said would not have been possible without God.

After her story she started briefing us on our work schedule for the day which included painting, clearing brush off trails, and many more jobs. While a few people went to prepare other things for the summer camp next week, the rest of us went to clear the brush of the trails. The brush, as it turned out, was sticks from arm size to foot thick logs. But we tirelessly cleared the trail despite the huge amount of wood ahead. The logs we carried slowly, with five or six people, to the edge of the trail. We worked until noon, in that manner, and stopped to eat our packed lunch. This time the meal was not silent. Working hard together seemed to have made us a lot closer and almost friends. Later on we started work again. This time we got together a convoy of a truck, a gator and four-wheeler and loaded them simultaneously from the trail exit piles. Meanwhile, the rest still hauled brush and fallen logs out of the trail. The manager worked right alongside us carrying a chain saw and chopping what was too heavy to carry. It was hard, sweaty, and sometimes, bloody work. However the meal had rejuvenated us and we worked hard until around 5:00 or 5:30. This time the van ride back to the church was loud and exited because we were making new friends and making a huge difference in children's lives. It was definitely not silent like before.

The rest of the week was tough, but very emotionally rewarding. We even got to help with a therapeutic horseback-riding lesson that was using the freshly cleared trails. Even though I'm not much of a fan of horses, watching those kids smile their huge smiles while riding was so heart-lifting that it brought tears to my eyes. I think we made a big difference that week doing this project and many others around the capitol of North Carolina. The experience was very positive and I will definitely be volunteering at another workcamp next summer.

Preacher or Performer? The Crying Baby Test

I was recently at a Conference where each day the Bible Study was led by a performance artist/theologian who acted out the biblical story and gave some exegetical/theological insight to the Scriptures. The content was terrific: substantial and challenging. But on the second day, a baby began to jibberjabber loudly in the audience. After a few minutes of this, the performer stopped the show, looked in frustration at the baby and parent, and said "I love children, but I'm getting really distracted." The parent and child got up and left the room...followed by several other parents who went out in solidarity. I talked later with the parent and I made this claim: a crying baby is a test as to whether someone is preaching or performing.

A performance is about focus and transmission of content: an act is onstage doing an activity (singing, dancing, speaking, instrument performance, etc) and it is the audience's job to receive the content and appreciate or engage it.

A sermon is "verbal and nonverbal communication of the inward manifestation of a command by the Holy Spirit to relate to others something about God's presence, purpose, and power in one's life and in the life of all of humanity" (Teresa Fry Brown, Delivering the Sermon, pp. 17)

Given these two definitions, I get how babies can be a distraction to a performance. As a parent of an 11-monthold, my crying baby seems to be about 10x louder for me than she is for other people. So I get how a baby would interrupt a performance's transmission of beauty or message because they interrupt that well-crafted focus.

But Preaching is about naming and claiming God's love present in the room. It's about that Holy Spirit that isn't given to the preacher and then transmitted to the people: that Spirit is in each one there and they communicate back and forth. Churches that have call-and-response to the preaching moment get this phenomenon, and to them, crying babies are just another "amen" section. The preacher is preaching if they connect with the congregation: calling out a crying baby and causing them to leave idolizes the spoken word as more important than the body of Christ fully present in the room.

It's my belief that if I can't preach over, above, through, or alongside a crying baby, then I have no business preaching. And I should do serious reflection as to whether I am performing the Word of God or if I am allowing the Word to speak through and without me-and the latter will not be stopped by a crying baby, and indeed, it is incomplete without the presence of all who need to experience it.
